For example, at the North Table Mountain trip on April 23rd, a baby rattlesnake was found in the collecting area. Fortunately, it was relocated without incident. Be prepared for the site conditions and bring plenty of water to drink.

Next, be considerate to the leader of the trip. If you sign-up to attend a trip, make every effort to be there. If something comes up and you cannot attend, let the leader know as soon as possible so they can fill your slot on an attendance "limited" trip or will not be looking for you at the rally point.

Finally, did I mention to have FUN!!!!!!

COLORADO MINERAL SOCIETY (CMS) was founded in 1936 by a group of distinguished individuals within the mineralogical field. The organization was incorporated as a non-profit, educational organization in 1948. The Society is affiliated with the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, a founding member of each group.

PURPOSE: To promote the study of minerals and other geologic materials, to encourage mineral collecting as a hobby and to conduct public meetings, lectures, and field trips, and to engage in all activities which relate to said purposes of the organization.

MEETINGS: General membership meetings start at 7:30 PM on the first Friday of each month, October through May, at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, at 10th and Garrison in Lakewood, CO. Displays are set up by members about one-half hour before meetings. Specimens may be available for sale and trade.

VISITORS and **GUESTS** are welcome.

BOARD MEETINGS: The board members meet once a month to complete the executive business and affairs of the Society. Meetings will start at 7:00 PM usually the third Tuesday of each month. Additional meeting times, if necessary, may be called by the President or any three members of the board and will be announced at the general or board meetings.

MEMBERSHIP: Open to all persons who agree to abide by Society rules and rules of the Federations. Annual fees: \$16.00 for a Family or Newsletter Membership, \$14.00 for a Single Membership, \$12.00 for a Senior Membership (single or family over 65), and \$12.00 for junior members under the age of 18 who are not included in a family. Name badges are available

for a one-time fee of \$7.50.

ANNUAL EVENTS: Yearly activities include a silent auction of minerals, fossils, gems, jewelry, equipment and other items related to our interests; participation in the Colorado Contin-tail, the largest mineral swap show in Colorado; participation as a member of the Greater Denver Area Gem and Mineral Council in sponsoring the largest gem and mineral show in Colorado; and the Founder's Day celebration.

FIELD TRIPS: The Society sponsors several field trips from Spring through Fall for the purpose of collecting minerals, crystals, and fossils. These trips are one-day, two-day, and occasionally several-day adventures. A field trip guide is published each year in May.

NEWSLETTER GUIDELINES: CMS has a proud history of promoting the education and pure enjoyment of the mineralogical world. At the very heart of its existence are the many volunteers and contributors who spend their time and efforts in direct support of the club's mission. The CMS official newsletter **MINERAL MINUTES** is published monthly during the active meeting season (October through May) and a summer edition, and is the primary way the club's activities and mission are communicated to its members and prospective members. On that basis, the Board of Directors would like to offer the following content guidelines for CMS newsletter contributions:

- Formal announcements concerning club business and/or membership
- Information around mineral-related education opportunities or fundraising activities
- Stories or history that concentrate on the edifying aspects of mineral collection and education
- Sharing of personal mineral-related experience from field trips or other related adventures serving an educational purpose
- Announcements of volunteer/leadership opportunities for the club or club representation
- Worthy news events or discoveries related to mineralogy or geology that align to club's core interests
- Appropriate announcements regarding mineral shows, one-time mineral related events, mineral auctions, sale of private collections and/or equipment, etc.
- Information around relevant donations and/or gifts made available to the club or club members

CMS Junior Rockhounds No May Program

The CMS Junior Rockhounds will not be meeting in May because the business of introducing and signing up for this summer's CMS field trips will require the full evening. Junior Rockhounds and their parents are nevertheless encouraged to attend the regular meeting and to participate in one or more of the upcoming field trips.

This summer CMS is organizing or participating in field trips especially suited for our junior members! Consider the trip to Elizabeth / Elbert County on May 14th and the trip to Red Feather Lakes on August 20th to be led by the CMS Junior Rockhounds Program Coordinator Lewis Reynolds. Also look for our joint trips with the Denver Gem & Mineral Guild's Golden Diggers (youth program) led by their leader Mary Lou Mobley. In addition to spending time in the dirt collecting minerals and fossils, these field trips will offer more education about the local geology and more guidance on finding specimens.

As parents or guardians and their junior rockhounds plan their summer collecting trips, two recommendations are offered. First, join trips to collect the types of specimens for which you may already have a strong passion (some examples of favorites include pyrite, barite, amazonite and smoky quartz, topaz, and amethyst). Second, it is educationally valuable to participate in a number of trips covering different geological environments (say, petrified wood from sedimentary rocks, quartz crystals from igneous rocks, and almandine garnets from metamorphic rocks). The field trip leaders have good experience with their areas, so be sure to talk with them about your interests and concerns.

2016 CMS Education Program Update

The Gem course was conducted in April of this year. A big thank you to Star Edwards for teaching the class, Colorado School of Mines for hosting it, and for all those who participated! Photos of the class are on Page 6.

For all those who expressed interest in the Mineral Identification Course for this Fall, we may have enough interest for the course. Since May is the last scheduled meeting prior to the start of the class in late Sept., we are asking that all those who would like to secure a spot in the class, bring their checkbooks to the May meeting. The cost to students is usually \$75, but depending on meeting place, we may need to add on the cost of venue. We should have final anticipated cost by time of the meeting.

Mineral Identification Course – Fall 2016 (10 lectures)

This course is a popular course that has been offered several times to CMS members in recent years. In this course, you will receive hands-on experience with mineral identification techniques along with gaining an understanding of basic Crystallography and the 6 core crystal systems. Participants will be issued microscopes and flats of minerals for use during the class. This course is designed to establish a working base of knowledge that students will be able to use in the field or at the shows to identify minerals and mineral associations. This is a great course for those who are fairly new to the mineral world or who just want to expand their skills in accurately identifying rocks and minerals. The course culminates in a test on the last day of course for purposes of measuring your confidence in what you have learned.

This class is taught by Ed Raines, Colorado School of Mines (CSM). It meets for 10 weeks at the CMS Geology Museum in the classroom across from the Geology Museum entrance and generally is held on a Monday or Wednesday – although the weekday can be flexible depending on the needs of the class.

The 2015 cost of course was \$150/person with CMS and the student contributing \$75 each, but may increase if we need to find a new venue. You may sign up as a couple (single student course) if you live at the same address and are willing to share all class materials. The class can accommodate 10 people ages 13 and up. 

Denver Gem & Mineral Show Mini Report May 2016

The Denver Gem & Mineral Show for 2016 will be here before you know it. Remember the dates are September 16 - 18, 2016 and the theme is "Minerals of Africa". The location is the Denver Mart, I-25 and 58th Avenue (Exit 215 on I-25). Thanks to Publicity Chair, Gloria Staebler, handsome flyers and postcards are available featuring exquisite specimens of tanzanite and diopside. The show is always a fantastic event for all of us gem, mineral and fossil hobbyists and collectors. Every club member should be a part of it.

Here is information concerning the last two competitions at the show - the Richard M. Pearl Trophy and the Club Prospector Trophy.

The Richard M. Pearl Trophy is awarded to the exhibitor of the best crystallized mineral specimen entered in the competition. The trophy is given in honor of Professor Richard M. Pearl, a longtime Colorado resident, who was instrumental in organizing both the American Federation and the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies and was past President of both. He was the second "Certified Gemologist" recognized by the American Gem Society, as well as the author of many books on Colorado geology and mineralogy. The competition is open to all exhibitors. Entries may be any crystallized mineral, thumbnail or larger, from any locality. The exhibitor must own the specimen. Quality, on a worldwide basis, will be the only criterion by which each mineral specimen will be judged. The exhibitor is limited to three entries for this trophy in a given year. A specimen is eligible to win this trophy only once. An exhibitor shall not be eligible to enter this competition for two years following receipt of the Pearl Trophy. Specimens entered in this category will be placed in special group cases provided by the Denver Show Committee and may not be part of a regular competitive or non-competitive display nor in any other special competition, such as the Species Competition. The deadline for entry is August 31, 2016.

The Club Prospector Trophy is open to any member club of the Greater Denver Area Gem and Mineral Council. A club is eligible to enter up to three specimens collected after September 17, 2015 on club-sponsored field trips in their exhibit. When the club installs its exhibit case on set-up Thursday, the club representative will designate the three specimens to be judged to the Judging Chair or designee. The Judging Committee will then number the designated specimens (1 through 3) in the same direction in all the entered cases. An aggregate entry, such as a vial of gold dust, or a group of loose topaz crystals would not constitute an eligible entry. A gold nugget or a single topaz crystal, or group of crystals on a single matrix, would be eligible. The specimens will be displayed in a standard Denver showcase with supporting information about the field trips. Maps, pictures, drawings, etc. can be used to make an attractive case that would be of interest to viewers. One third of the case score will be on showmanship as defined in the AFMS Rules. The other two thirds of the case score will be double the highest score from among the three quality scores awarded to the specimens. AFMS Showmanship Rules for minerals refer to the ability of the exhibitor to use the material exhibited, the background material, lighting, arrangement, and labeling features (such as size, neatness, etc.) to create a display which will attract and hold the interest of the viewer upon the specimens exhibited. The deadline for entry is Tuesday, September 6, 2016.
